# A guide to the Scotch whisky regions

Like wines, the single malts of Scotland are grouped by region although these regions offer a guideline rather than a rule. The regions of Scotland – the Lowlands, the Highlands, Campbeltown and the island of Islay – have their origins in the regulation of licences and duties, but they do also embrace certain characteristics.

### The Lowlands

This area tends to produce softer malts, without the peat of the Highlands or the brininess of the coastal malts. The Lowlands is defined by a line following old county boundaries and running from the Clyde estuary to the River Tay. The line swings north of Glasgow and Dumbarton and runs to Dundee and Perth.

### The Highlands, Islands and Speyside

By far the largest region, the Highlands embraces wide variations in style. The western Highlands has only a few scattered distilleries, and it is difficult to generalise about their character. If they have anything in common, it is a rounded, firm, dry character, with some peatiness. The far north of the Highlands has several whiskies with a notably heathery, spicy, character, probably deriving both from the local soil and the coastal location of the distilleries. The more sheltered East Highlands and the Midlands of Scotland (sometimes described as the South Highlands) have a number of notably fruity whiskies.

None of these Highland areas is officially regarded as a region, but the area between them, known as Speyside, is universally acknowledged as the heartland of malt distillation. This area, between the cities of Inverness and Aberdeen, sweeps from granite mountains down to fertile countryside, where barley is among the crops. It is the watershed of a system of rivers, the principal among which is the Spey. Although it is not precisely defined, Speyside is commonly agreed to extend at least from the River Findhorn in the west to the Deveron in the east. Within this region are several other rivers, notably the Livet.

The Speyside single malts are noted in general for their elegance and complexity, and often a refined smokiness. Beyond that, they have two extremes: the big, sherryish type, as typified by The Macallan, Glenfarclas and Aberlour; and the lighter, more subtle style. Within Speyside, the River Livet is so famous that its name is borrowed by some whiskies from far beyond its glen.

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Only one may call itself The Glenlivet, only Braes of Glenlivet and Tamnavulin are produced in the valley, and only Tomintoul in the parish. These are all delicate malts, and it could be more tentatively argued that other valleys have malts that share certain characteristics. The Highland region includes a good few coastal and island malts, but one peninsula and just one island have been of such historical importance in the industry that they are each regarded as being regions in their own right.

### Campbeltown

On the peninsula called the Mull of Kintyre, on the west coast of Scotland, Campbeltown once had about 30 distilleries. Today, it has only two. One of these, Springbank, produces two different single malts. This apparent contradiction is achieved by the use of a lightly peated malt in one and a smokier kilning in the other. The Campbeltown single malts are very distinctive, with a briny character. Although there are only three of them, they are still considered by serious malt lovers to represent a region in their own right.

### Islay

Pronounced "eye-luh", this is the greatest of whisky islands: much of it deep with peat, lashed by the wind, rain and sea in the Inner Hebrides. It is only 25 miles long, but has no fewer than eight distilleries, although not all are working. Its single malts are noted for their seaweedy, iodine-like, phenolic character. A dash of Islay malt gives the unmistakable tang of Scotland to many blended whiskies.

### Tasting notes

We have included a brief tasting note for each of the many single malt whiskies on our list which we hope will prove useful to both novice and seasoned drinkers. By their nature, tasting notes are always subjective and so you may not agree with what we say! We are indebted to the many different sources who have provided these notes, not least [www.whisky-world.com](http://www.whisky-world.com) which provides a wealth of information for the whisky enthusiast. We are lacking a few notes – so all submissions are welcome.

<b>631</b>	<b>Aberfeldy 1978</b> <i>Southern Highlands, bottled by Gordon &amp; MacPhail</i> Oily, sweet and creamy with great length and peat smoke. Well oaked, it is a perfect pudding whisky.	40%	<b>£11.70</b>

<b>635</b>	<b>Ardbeg 10yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> The nose is amazingly smoky with a whiff of tar-covered rope. The palate is robust with more peat smoke and the flavours of turf and lapsang souchong. A long finish with a fragrant peaty reek. Whilst flavour-packed this is still a delicate scotch.	46%	<b>£6.90</b>
<b>637</b>	<b>Ardbeg 1977</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> The tar-like Ardbeg trademark of bonfires on the beach and boats caulked with pitch. Complex and mouth filling, it is light-bodied but oily. It clings to the tongue and has a lemony sweetness.	46%	<b>£17.80</b>
<b>638</b>	<b>Ardbeg 30yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Referred to by some as "the Princess of Islay whiskies". <b>653</b>	<b>Bowmore Darkest</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> The sherry aroma is fantastic, together with almonds and mature oak. The peaty notes become an excellent foil to the fruity flavours and do not allow the sherry to totally dominate. Hints of the sea drift in given a little time in the glass. Soft over ripe dark grapes flood the palate like an incoming tide. It's rich, but not over the top, due to the wonderful heather fire smoky flavour you will find on the back palate. <b>654</b>	<b>Bowmore Dusk Bordeaux Finish</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Apricots, honeydew melon and lychee followed by the Claret's zesty sweetness, then it's salty sea breezes and peat fires with grace notes of lemon zest, marzipan, warm vanilla and candy floss. A very complex and compelling range of aromas. Immediately the Claret flavours arrive, just ahead of the peaty, smouldering warmth of the Islays, wave after wave of flavours: dark chocolate, liquorice and black bun. <b>655</b>	<b>Bowmore 17yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Full bodied, with marshmallow softness. Fantastic balanced nose of peat smoke, dark chocolate and exotic fruit and a complex palate with peat smoke, seasalt, and toffee-chocolate sweetness and hints of lemon and digestive biscuits. A lingering and mellow finish.	43%	<b>£10.10</b>
<b>656</b>	<b>Bowmore Dawn</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Initially it's the sea spray, the wet seaweed, citrus, damp wool, peat fire smoke and charcoal embers. Then the port imparts its aromas; red currant, black plums, dried prune, bittersweet chocolate, violets and flowering currant. (At this strength, you require a little water to release the aromas – be careful not to over water, just a few drops at a time until you are satisfied with the nose). Fairly robust on the palate with sweet flavours of grapes, plums and fig rolls with an underlying blackcurrant-citrus quality all being imparted from the superb port casks.	56%	<b>£9.70</b>
<b>651</b>	<b>Bowmore 21yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Golden amber with a full, mellow and rich body. The nose is Olorosso sherry with peat smoke biscuits and oak with hints of lemon and honey. A sweet, soft sherry taste with lots of heather smokiness, a subtle hazelnut dryness and a soft sea tang. The finish is warm and soft.	43%	<b>£19.30</b>
<b>657</b>	<b>Bowmore 25yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Full and round, with a gentle softness, the nose has a strong herb-like fragrance over-lying the sherry and peat notes. The palate has plenty of sherry, but surely as night follows day, you will find the oak, the smoke, the brine, the ozone, ending with toffee and hazelnut. The finish is mellow, gentle and warming. Try in front of a peat fire with a Gale Force 8 raging outside.	43%	<b>£36.00</b>
<b>658</b>	<b>Bowmore 1957</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> Full bodied with a well-balanced soft rounded texture showing lots of personality and character gained from "the big sleep" on Islay. All the classic notes from a first filled ex bourbon cask, which probably started its journey about 1950 in Kentucky, are to be found. Pine, cedar, candied-almonds, oak, vanilla, candied pear, tropical fruit and bubblegum. Add to that the tide going out sandy sea aroma, just a trace of peat, and the lemon zest key note of Islay and you have discovered an olfactory hidden treasure. The peaty Islay character is more evident on the palate as is the sea salt which clings to the lips, layers of caramel and soft fruit, sweet corn, salted butter and dried apples – it's Pandora's box.
